



WHEN WE DRINK THIS CUP



Church Teaching

>"It is the **duty** of citizens to contribute along with the civil authorities to the good of society in a spirit of truth, justice, solidarity, and freedom. The love and service of one's country follow from the duty of gratitude and belong to the order of charity. Submission to legitimate authorities and service of the common good require citizens to fulfill their roles in the life of the political community." –CCC #2239.

"The Eucharist demands that we be members of the one body of the Church... We must not forget that the mysticism of the sacrament has a social character. When those who receive it turn a blind eye to the poor and suffering... the Eucharist is received unworthily." Amoris Latitia #186



Guidance from Bishops

> "The Catholic community brings important assets to the political dialogue about our nation's future. We bring a consistent moral framework—drawn from basic human reason that is illuminated by Scripture and the teaching of the Church—for assessing issues, political platforms, and **campaigns**. We also bring broad experience in serving those in need educating the young, serving families in crisis, caring for the sick, sheltering the homeless, helping women who face difficult pregnancies, feeding the hungry, welcoming immigrants and refugees, reaching out in global solidarity, and pursuing peace." –Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, 12



What are Legislative Visits?

- Diocesan Advocacy DayCoordinators will schedulelegislative visits.
- ➤ With a team leader, teams of 3-5 Catholics visit 1 - 3 legislative offices.
- ➤ Teams discuss at least one specific bill on the 2019 legislative agenda.
- ➤ This is an opportunity educate, inform, and witness to our faith.







How to continue advocacy in person:

- Introduce yourself as constituents.
- Explain:
 - that you have a meeting with ______, or
 - o explain the topic you'd like to talk about; ask who to talk to.
- Explain your position on the topic.
- Provide examples from local experience.
- Listen to their feedback.
- Thank staff before leaving.
- Explain you'll be watching for a good vote.





How to be ineffective:

- Be angry, hostile, or threaten.
- Be disrespectful.
- Ignore comments and concerns.
- Overwhelm with too much information.
- Forget to thank helpful staff.

Life and Family Life

Human life is intrinsically valuable and should be protected by law from fertilization to natural death. Moreover, the family is the sanctuary of life in which parents teach children how they ought to live.





Topic 1: Protect Human Life

- Oppose abortion and euthanasia;
- eliminate funding for abortion providers;
- increase funding to abortion alternatives;
- eliminate wrongful birth lawsuits;
- recognize the sacredness, fidelity, and permanency of marriage;
- improve foster care through a community-based model; and
- increase recruitment and support of foster, adoptive, and biological parents.



Immigration

The Church supports immigration reform that is merciful to those here simply working for a better life and recognizes the responsibility of the government to maintain its sovereignty.



Topic 2: Immigration

- Oppose efforts to reduce access by immigrants to IDs, birth certificates, drivers' licenses, education, and healthcare;
- support care for unaccompanied minors and alternatives to family detention;
- support enforcement measures which are targeted, proportional, and humane; and
- support the reunification of immigrant families.



Restorative Justice

In response to crime, the state has primary responsibility to uphold justice, with the goals of achieving restitution, protecting the common good, deterring offenses, and rehabilitating offenders.



Topic 3: Restorative Justice

- Oppose the death penalty;
- support bail reforms;
- rehabilitate non-violent state jail offenders;
- raise the age of criminal responsibility;
- support parole review of juveniles with lengthy sentences; and
- recategorize rent-to-own defaults as a civil offense.



Education

The overall education of children is a most serious duty and at the same time a primary right of parents. The State must support parents in their indeclinable role.



Topic 4: Education

- Support school choice;
- create a statewide "do-not-hire" registry;
- support student-based education finance;
- increase Tuition Equalization Grant funding;
- protect of the autonomy of private schools; and
- support access to PK and child care.



Healthcare

The Church promotes healthcare in accord with the principles of bioethics, especially offering care to those who have special needs because of age, addiction, and physical or mental disability.



Topic 5: Healthcare

- Support care which respects patient dignity and physician conscience;
- support access to palliative care and monitor changes to the advance directive act;
- increase access to health insurance and healthcare;
- improve the health of Texas mothers;
- support preventative care and enhanced education to help patients manage their health; and
- increase access to treatment for addiction.



Social Concerns

The Church serves the poor and the vulnerable by providing services and advocating for the common good. Those unable to help themselves are in particular need of aid.




Topic 6: Social Concerns

- Reduce marriage penalties in public assistance;
- oppose usurious payday / auto-title loans;
- incentivize self-sufficiency in public assistance;
- support care for persons with disabilities;
- alleviate food insecurity and hunger; and
- combat human trafficking, care for victims, and reunify families.



Religious Liberty

Society itself profits by the moral qualities of justice and peace which have their origin in people's faithfulness to God and to His holy will. Dignitatis Humanae #6




Topic 7: Religious Liberty

- Protect religious liberty, especially as it pertains to human life, marriage, and the family;
- support conscience protection for government contractors, especially in healthcare, education, and social services; and
- support incentives for donations by taxpayers to faith-based nonprofits.

- Increase understanding of Texas' water availability;
- increase efficiency and conservation in water use to maintain availability for irrigation and drinking;

- increase efficiency in disaster recovery coordination among non-profits.
